



## Multnomah County Animal Services April 2019 Monthly Report

**The Multnomah County Animal Shelter (MCAS) accepted 533 animals in April 2019.** The majority of intakes were stray and impounded animals. Dogs and cats were the most commonly accepted animals.

**The Multnomah County Animal Shelter released 484 animals.** The majority of these animals were adopted, reclaimed, or transferred to another agency for care. Dogs and cats were the most commonly released animals.

### Other Services Provided By MCAS Staff

- Our veterinary staff conducted **155** spay and neuter surgeries.
- Our customer service staff processed **4,195** pet licenses.
